ANDREW R. NOVO is an Associate Professor of Strategic Studies at the National Defense University, Washington, DC. He studied classics at Princeton University before getting a master's degree in international relations and a PhD in modern history from St. Antony's College, the University of Oxford. An expert in ancient and modern Mediterranean history, strategic studies, international relations, and military history, Dr. Novo has taught at Georgetown University and lectured at the University of Cyprus, the United States Military Academy, the United States Naval Academy, and the National Arts Club in New York.

Dr. Novo worked as a researcher at Harvard Business School and spent three years living in Cyprus where he taught at the European University in Nicosia and conducted research for his doctoral degree. He has published academic articles in peer-reviewed journals and opinion-editorials in various media outlets from the Asia Times to the Harvard International Review. He is the author of two books, *When Small Countries Crash* (2011) detailing financial crises in small economies and *Queen of Cities* (2010), a historical novel on the fall of Constantinople. Dr. Novo is also a participant in the US Speaker Program run by the Department of State.

His research and speaking interests include: Mediterranean history and politics, grand strategy, American foreign policy and NATO.

He speaks French and Modern Greek and is conversant in Italian.
