**Professor Carolyn Davidson** is an Assistant Professor at NDU's College of International Security Affairs (CISA). She has taught the core course in Geostrategy, as well as "Themes in American Foreign Relations" and electives on NATO and the European Union. Carolyn is a Ph.D. candidate in history at Yale University and is in the process of completing her dissertation, "Managing Multilateralism: the United States, France and NATO, 1958-1970." The dissertation reflects her dual interest in international history and policy studies.

From 2008 to 2009 Carolyn held the Mellon Fellowship in Contemporary History at the Elliott School, George Washington University. She was a Brookings Institution Research Fellow (2007-2008) and a Visiting Fellow at Sciences-Po, Paris (2006). She is currently a fellow in the Tobin Project's National Security program, and was selected as a Triangle Institute for Security Studies "New Face" in Security Studies in 2008. She is a graduate of Cambridge University and holds a Master's degree in Law from Yale Law School. Carolyn has three chapters in edited volumes, one on de Gaulle and the United States in Mark Kramer's Cold War Studies Series, *International Perspectives on de Gaulle's Foreign Policies* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2011), "The Atlantic Community and de Gaulle's European Ideal," in Giles Scott-Smith (ed.), *The Atlantic Community and the European Idea from Kennedy to Nixon*, (Soleb, 2011), and "Between Power and Partnership: The Prudent Uses of Multilateralism," in the Tobin Project's *The Prudent Use of Power in American National Security Strategy*, (2009).
